A truly incredible person and our students were completely absorbed by his tales.




Also, as part of their Year 10 Excellence Program Carrie F and Alina L have both produced fantastic posters which are now on display in the Art department.

Their first session with Youth Options covered drug and alcohol misuse, the second introduced the story of Shaun Attwood whose life story is one of academic success, moving to America to work on the stock markets with a net worth of £2 million where his addictive nature for highs led him to become involved in Ecstasy trafficking. Shaun talked very openly about his life choices and their

consequences for him and his family.
Year 11 enjoyed a morning of mental health
activities including sports, movies and quiet work
spaces as well as a First Aid session teaching
them basic lifesaving skills. After lunch students
joined Year 10 to hear Shaun speak whilst others

## Holocaust Memorial Day

Friday 27th January once again marks Holocaust Memorial Day. This week students have had assemblies discussing this year's theme - 'Ordinary People', reflecting on how so many of the people involved in the Holocaust and other genocides in the years following were "ordinary people", doing things because they were following orders.

This included Henryk Gawkowski, a train driver who deported over 18,000 Jewish people to their death at Treblinka and the persecuted like Rudolf Brazda, the last Concentration Camp Survivor who was deported for homosexuality and who went on to live an 'ordinary' life in France.
